



## Prince William County Schools Summer Reading Program

### Suggested Reading List for Grades 6 - 8

The purpose of the PWCS Summer Reading Program is to encourage students to enjoy quality literature and to continue developing their independent reading skills. Student participation in the program is voluntary. Students who choose to participate in the program are required to complete a minimum of two books.

Students participating in the program in Grades 6 - 8 will complete a list of books read. The documentation is to include the name of the author, the title of the book, an explanation of the topic or plot of the book, and a parent or guardian statement that the student has completed the reading.

Students in Grades 6 - 8 who participate in Prince William County Public Library's Summer Reading Program— Journey Through Books, the Public Library documentation will apply. Students will receive an extra “A” (100) for each book completed, for a total of two. The summer reading documentation will be submitted by the student by the end of the first week of school.

Roth, Veronica	<i>Divergent</i> or any book in the series by Veronica Roth	2011	A teenager living in a dystopian society finds herself at a crossroads when she is supposed to choose one of her society's factions, each prizing a different quality: honesty, selflessness, bravery, peacefulness, and intelligence.

Chainani, Soman	<i>The School for Good and Evil</i> or any book in the series by Soman Chainani.	2013	With her glass slippers and devotion to good deeds, Sophie knows she'll earn top marks at the School for Good and join the ranks of past students like Cinderella, Rapunzel, and Snow White. Meanwhile, Agatha, with her shapeless black frocks and wicked black cat, seems a natural fit for the villains in the School for Evil.

With Richard riding shotgun, the unlikely pair scour the state, undaunted by blinding storms, crazed pigs, flying bullets, and giant gators.

Ryan, Pam Munoz	<i>Echo</i> or any other book by Pam Munoz Ryan	2015	Lost and alone in a forbidden forest, Otto meets three mysterious sisters and suddenly finds himself entwined in a puzzling quest involving a prophecy, a promise, and a harmonica. Decades later, Friedrich in Germany, Mike in Pennsylvania, and Ivy in California each, in turn, become interwoven when the very same harmonica lands in their lives. All the children face daunting challenges: rescuing a father, protecting a brother, holding a family together. And ultimately, pulled by the invisible thread of destiny, their solo stories converge in an orchestral crescendo.
Nielsen, Jennifer A.	<i>Mark of the Thief</i> or any other book in the series by Jennifer A. Nielsen	2015	Nic Calva and his sister are slaves in the mines outside Rome. When Nic is forced to enter one of the mines to retrieve the treasures of Julius Caesar, he finds much more than everyone could have expected—a magic amulet. When Nic takes the amulet for himself, hoping to gain freedom, he becomes involved in a battle that could destroy Rome.
Park, Linda Sue	<i>Forest of Wonders</i> in the Wing & Claw Series or any other middle school book by Linda Sue Park	2016	Raffa Santana has always loved the mysterious Forest of Wonders. For a gifted young apothecary like him, every leaf has the potential to unleash a kind of magic. If only Raffa's cautious father would allow him to experiment freely, Raffa knows he could discover miracles. When an injured bat crashes into Raffa's life, he invents a cure from a rare crimson vine that he finds deep in the forest. The powers of the vine are stronger than Raffa could have imagined. His remedy saves the animal but also transforms it into something much more than an ordinary bat, with far-reaching consequences.

In <i>Fishbone's Song</i> , this boy reminisces about the magic of the man who raised him and the tales that he used to tell—all true, but different each time.
Preller, James	<i>The Fall</i> or any middle school book by James Preller	2015	In writing in his journal about middle school classmate Morgan Mallen's suicide from bullying, Sam explores whether he was a friend, or one of the bullies who ignored her at school and tormented her online.

At 15, he had climbed the tallest mountain on every continent. This is the inspiring true story of Jordan's quest to make his dream come true through sheer force of will and determination against the odds.

When he's told he can't play baseball following an operation on his heart, Jeremiah decides he'll do the next best thing and become a coach. But Jeremiah finds the town where he has just moved caught up in a scandal and about ready to give up on baseball. It's up to Jeremiah and his can-do spirit to get the town - and the team - back in the game.

Collins, Suzanne	<i>The Hunger Games</i> or any book by Suzanne Collins	2008	Sixteen-year-old Katniss Everdeen accidentally becomes a contender in the annual Hunger Games, a grave competition hosted by the Capitol where young boys and girls are pitted against one another in a televised fight to the death.
Davies, Jacqueline	<i>Nothing but Trouble</i> or any book by Jacqueline Davies	2016	Maggie's town has always been too small for her big scientific ideas. Between her stuck-in-a-rut mom, her grumpy grandpop, and the lifetime supply of sludgy soda in the fridge, it's hard for Maggie to imagine a change. But when Lena moves in with her creative spirit and outrageous perspective, middle school takes off with a bang. These two smart girls are determined to liven up their town—one epic prank at a time.

Hale, Shannon	<i>Real Friends</i> or any book by Shannon Hale	2017	(nonfiction) Shannon and Adrienne have been best friends ever since they were little. But one day, Adrienne starts hanging out with Jen, the most popular girl in class and the leader of a circle of friends called The Group. Everyone in The Group wants to be Jen's #1, and some girls would do anything to stay on top . . . even if it means bullying others. In this graphic memoir, Shannon Hale reflects on her childhood friendships.
Hunt, Lynda Mullaly	<i>One for the Murphys</i> or any book by Lynda Mullaly Hunt	2012	Carley struggles with being open to love after she suffers a betrayal that forces her to move in with a foster family.
Lewis, C.S.	<i>The Magician's Nephew</i> or any book in The Chronicles of Narnia series by C.S. Lewis	1955	On a daring quest to save a life, two friends are hurled into another world, where an evil sorceress seeks to enslave them. But then the lion Aslan's song weaves itself into the fabric of a new land, a land that will be known as Narnia. And in Narnia, all things are possible.
Lu, Marie	<i>Legend</i> or any book in the Legend series by Marie Lu	2011	What was once the western United States is now home to the Republic, a nation perpetually at war with its neighbors. Born into an elite family in one of the Republic's wealthiest districts, fifteen-year-old June is a prodigy being groomed for success in the Republic's highest military circles. Born into the slums, fifteen-year-old Day is the country's most wanted criminal. But his motives may not be as malicious as they seem.

As he grows older, Michael stays with his grandfather during the summer holidays and learns the story behind Grandpa's injuries, finally getting to know the real man behind the solemn figure from his childhood.
Pfeffer, Susan Beth	<i>Life as We Knew It</i> or any book in the Last Survivors series by Susan Beth Pfeffer	2006	Through journal entries, sixteen-year-old Miranda describes her family's struggle to survive after a meteor hits the moon, causing worldwide tsunamis, earthquakes, and volcanic eruptions.
Reynolds, Jason	<i>Ghost</i> or any middle school book by Jason Reynolds	2016	Ghost. Lu. Patina. Sunny. Four kids from wildly different backgrounds with personalities that are explosive when they clash. But they are also four kids chosen for an elite middle school track team—a team that could qualify them for the Junior Olympics if they can get their acts together. They all have a lot to lose, but they also have a lot to prove, not only to each other, but to themselves.

Woodson, Jacqueline	<i>Brown Girl Dreaming</i> or any book by Jacqueline Woodson	2016	(Nonfiction) Raised in South Carolina and New York, Jacqueline Woodson always felt halfway home in each place. In vivid poems, she shares what it was like to grow up as an African American in the 1960s and 1970s, living with the remnants of Jim Crow and her growing awareness of the Civil Rights movement.
