Key Concepts

Advanced Academics: Classes such as AP, IB, Cambridge, CTE, or Dual Enrollment where you earn weight in your GPA and have the potential to earn college credit. Search the college registrar's website for transfer credit standards.

Certification or Credential: A certificate is an official document that proves you've completed a course or achieved a particular skill. A credential is a broader term that refers to a qualification or achievement.

Financial Aid: Funds such as loans or grants that are provided to help pay tuition, fees, and other educational expenses.

Grade Point Average (GPA): Weighted GPA reflects the difficulty of the courses you take, giving extra points such as 5.0 representing A. Unweighted GPA, on the other hand, doesn't consider course difficulty and uses a simple 4.0 scale where an A equals 4.0.


