Key Concepts

Advanced Academics: Classes such as AP, IB, Cambridge, CTE, or Dual Enrollment where you earn weight in your GPA and have the potential to earn college credit. Search the college registrar's website for [transfer credit](#) standards.

Certification or Credential: A certificate is an official document that proves you've completed a course or achieved a particular skill. A credential is a broader term that refers to a qualification or achievement.

Financial Aid: Funds such as loans or grants that are provided to help pay tuition, fees, and other educational expenses.

Grade Point Average (GPA): Weighted GPA reflects the difficulty of the courses you take, giving extra points such as 5.0 representing A. Unweighted GPA, on the other hand, doesn't consider course difficulty and uses a simple 4.0 scale where an A equals 4.0.

4. Research [credential and certificate](#) opportunities you can earn.
5. Attend the PWCS summer job fair. Internships are available in many industries.



College Action Steps

1. Courses, grades, attendance, and more are on your transcript as mandated by VDOE.
2. Get involved in ways that are authentic to your interests and values.
3. Attend [college visits at your high school](#). College applications open in August.
4. Complete the [FAFSA](#) for both need-based and merit aid; opens in fall of senior year.
5. End the year with your best effort. A strong GPA is needed for merit scholarships.

Military Action Steps

1. All careers exist in the [military](#). Explore your best-fit pathways!
2. Scores from the [ASVAB](#) exam can give you insight into careers.
3. Pass the physical! Your recruiter will discuss eligibility requirements with you.
4. Connect with a service enlistment counselor to identify the right job specialty.
5. Accept an offer through [ROTC](#), an [academy appointment](#), or via the oath of enlistment.

Apprenticeship Program Action Steps

1. Learn about different careers that offer [apprenticeships](#).
2. Find approved [apprenticeship programs](#) as you build your career.
3. Review the application process and prepare for apprenticeship exams and internship interviews!
4. Complete the apprenticeship program applications by the deadline.
5. Maintain good work habits with a daily routine and organization.

Size

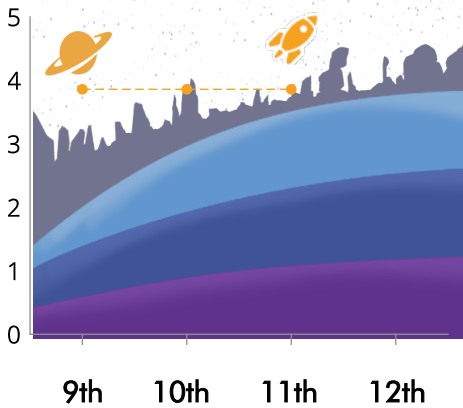
