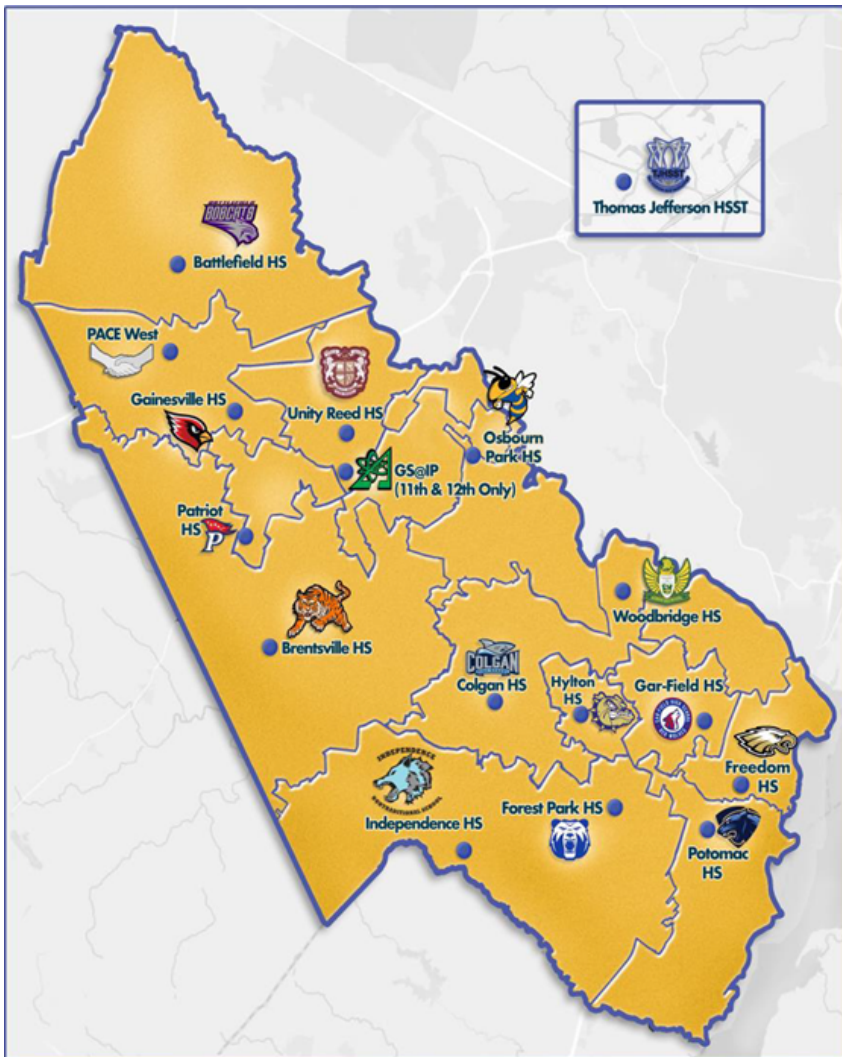

College: Associate's Degree

Earn an Associate's degree or certificate in two years or less by attending a two-year community college or junior college.



College: Bachelor's Degree

Earn a Bachelor's degree in four years by attending a four-year private or public college or university.



Military

Enlist in a branch of the U.S. Armed Forces right after high school or join after college by enrolling in a Reserve Office Training Corps (ROTC) program.



Career Education or Trade School

Enroll in a short-term training program at a career or vocational-technical college and earn a certificate or associate's degree for an industry such as health care, cosmetology, and plumbing.



Apprenticeship Program

Enroll in an apprenticeship to get on-the-job training with classroom instruction and mentorship that leads to a skilled trade or profession.
