# Graduation Action Steps

# 1. Meet with your IEP Case Manager:

Know who your Case Manager is, and set ongoing meetings.

- Review this document
- Review your IEP Transition Plan

#### 2. Know your IEP Goals:

Work with your IEP Team to set and understand your goals.

- Post-secondary Goals
- Annual Goals
- Consider a studentled IEP meeting

# 3. Connect with your Student Counselor:

Know who your School Counselor is and set ongoing meetings.

- Explore Post-secondary Options (that relate to your Post School Goals)
- Know and understand graduation status

# 4. Explore Agency Linkages:

Work with the Transition Specialist to explore and connect with community and adult agencies.

- Be aware of eligibility criteria for these agencies
- Contact agencies independently or with support.

#### 5. Meet with your Transition Specialist:

- Explore Post-Graduation options and requirements
- Review <u>Explore</u> and <u>Project SEARCH</u> programs
- Complete necessary applications



# Career Connected Learning Action Steps

- 1. Work with your school transition specialist to identify opportunities suited for you.
- 2. Talk to your school team to identify work-based learning opportunities and job fairs.
- 3. Prepare yourself for the PWCS Transition Fair by reflecting on your future goals.
- 4. Research credential and certificate opportunities.
- 5. Attend the PWCS summer job fair. Consider job shadowing a parent or guardian.



# Community College Action Steps

- 1. Every class counts. Challenge yourself in courses where you feel strong.
- 2. Get involved in ways that are authentic to your interests, values, and passion.
- 3. Attend a PWCS college fair, college tours, and college visits at your school.
- 4. January is a busy time for scholarship applications and submitting the FAFSA.

End the year STRONG! Your final performance is important.



# Military Action Steps

- 1. All careers exist in the military with opportunities through enlistment and beyond. Meet with a recruiter.
- 2. Scores from the ASVAB exam can give you insight into careers.
- 3. Pass the physical! Your recruiter will discuss eligibility requirements with you.
- 4. Connect with a service enlistment counselor to identify the right job specialty.
- 5. Accept an offer through ROTC, an academy appointment, or via the oath of enlistment.



# Apprenticeship/ Internship Program Action Steps

- 1. Learn about different careers that offer apprenticeships and internships.
- 2. Find approved apprenticeship & internship programs as you build your career. Explore PWCS Project SEARCH & full-day internship programs.
- 3. Review the application process and prepare for apprenticeship exams and interviews!
- 4. Complete the apprenticeship or internship program applications by the deadline.
- 5. Maintain good work habits with a daily routine and organization.
